ADULT EDUCATION A new course 'Braunston Village' will start on Wednesday April 29th, in the School Library from 7.30 to 9.45pm. This course will take a historical look at the main features of the village, its basic plan, the layout of the fields, the road, canal and rail network, different types of housing, population diversity and growth. It will show the continuity as well as the changes in village life and provide a basis for comparison with other villages in this area.

The 6 week course given by Mr. L.W. Herne, costs £6.48 for adults, £5.24 students, £2.16 pensioners and to those who are on Family Income Supplement or are unemployed, the course is free.

Recently some households in the Village have suffered the misfortune of a visit from a burglar. Large scale robberies may require elaborate planning but many small scale thefts are encouraged when people neglect ordinary precautions, for example very expensive bikes are left lying by the gate or garden wall. An unlocked car with a valuable coat or bag of groceries left unattended presents the thief with a golden opportunity. Observing a few precautions will save much heartache.
