VILLAGE NOTES Now in the autumn season perhaps the bright colours of the fading leaves are some compensation for the shorter and cooler days. Nature has a way of making use of all its by products. Though we may bemoan the loss of the gay autumn leaves they are being reduced to compost by the humble services of woodlice and earthworms. The moulds which complete this process belong to a vast body of plants; the fungi. Although these are around us all the year autumn is the season when they manifest themselves most clearly. The most common is the field mushroom. Many fungi are edible, e.g. the ink cap, plain and shaggy and the yellow chanterelle. One which occurs locally is the earth-star, but before you think of trying any other than the mushroom as an article of diet seek advice from an expert. The stink horn fungus would repel anyone other than the keenest student of fungi, and the brilliant red caps of the Fly Agaric spotted with white spots is attractive but carries a deadly poison. Many fungi have provided material for the writers of murder mysteries so it is wise to restrict your diet to the entirely safe field mushroom.
