VILLAGE NOTES A lady observed that a thrush was fat, when in fact it had fluffed out its feathers and in so doing it had enclosed itself in a layer of warm air, trapped in the feathers. Air, so cannot be a poor conductor of heat i.e. it allows heat to pass only slowly through. We take advantage of this when we use a blanket or an eiderdown which is a cushion containing air trapped between the feathers of a bird - especially those of the eider duck. The feathers of all birds share this quality but those whose habitat is watery are waterproofed with oil secreted from a gland. Feathers are used to retain heat but their insulating quality is used in the reverse direction. A chemist working with materials which must be kept at a low temperature, e.g. when nitrating tallow in the preparation of T.N.T. must keep everything cold so the apparatus is enclosed in feathers to EXCLUDE heat.
