It seems a long time since the last BVN; summer has come and almost gone. I would like to thank the Village for the support they gave to the Church Fete; the weather just about held out and everyone had a thoroughly good time. The sum of about £900 was raised which just about paid for the urgent repair to the Church heating! Thank you all very much.

At the risk of being boring, I must come back to the relationship of the Church to the Village. The Church is here to serve the VILLAGE. We will baptize those Villagers, or their children, who wish to be a part of the Church. We will marry anyone who lives in the Village, irrespective of their religion or lack of one. We will hold Funeral Services and bury anyone of the Village who has died. With the exception of Funerals (where we use discretion in the case of ex-Villagers) these ministries apply only to those who actually live in Braunston. The Churchyard, and that includes what we locally call the cemetery, is a part of the Church. (It is a part of the freehold of the incumbent for the time being and 'belongs' to him, in trust.) Nothing should be done in the Churchyard without my knowledge, and if necessary, permission. Obviously this does not apply to tending and maintenance of graves, but it does apply to everything else, such as the placing of monuments. Recently, as many of you will know, someone buried some cremated remains, themselves, unbeknowns to me. The situation has been resolved, a Burial Service has been held and recorded in the Parish Registers. This was highly irregular and is just the sort of thing which must not occur.

We will be returning from holidays to our more settled routines in the next month, but there are always things to look forward to, such as School, the Harvest Festival and Supper (9-10th Oct.) and the Village Panto; all part of the joy of life in a Community. Michael Tompkins.

WASTE PAPER COLLECTIONS - SATURDAYS 3RD SEPTEMBER AND 1st OCTOBER

Please note that as from the first Saturday in September there will be a change in procedure for the collection of your waste newspapers and magazines. In future collections around the village will take place on the same day as the merchant's skip vehicle comes to pick up the material. We are grateful to John and Kathleen Bowd for allowing us to use the Plough car park where the skip will be situated from about 8.30am until no later than 11am. In view of this you are requested to ensure your waste paper is put out by 9.30am at the latest on each collection day.

However, if you should have any reason, or would prefer, please bring your bundles to the Plough car park (using the Church Road entrance only) for direct loading into the skip. Also a reminder that wheresoever possible your old newspapers and magazines should be tightly bundled and secured with suitable string or twine.

This new procedure will not only obviate the necessity for maintaining storage space and double handling but also the time so generously donated by our small band of volunteers. It is almost 4 years since we began waste paper collections on behalf of Braunston Church and we hope that with the continued co-operation of everyone concerned we can maintain collections for many years to come.
