No P.C.C. this month, but the ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MESTING will be held in the Village Library on Thursday, 17th March at 7.45pm.

Lent is not meant to be a gloomy time, although we might make it so. It is a time when we think about Spring and Spring-cleaning. We can usefully use this time to Spring-clean ourselves, looking within ourselves to see what motivates us and seeing how we match up to our vocation in this life. Although Christians consider their own profession of Faith at this time, whatever our religion or philosophy of life it is good for all of us occasionally to take out our Life's route map to see if we have gone wrong and if we have some unhelpful burdens in our pack. Lent is the perfect time for this. The Resurrection of Spring and Easter are not far away.

I have been asked to write something about the Cemetery and the erection of Memorials. At the outset I must say thay I am bound by the 'rules' concerning Chunchyards and those have the force of Law. Permission must always be sought for the erection of a memorial, it is not a right. The man who has the last word on what may or may not be erected is the Chancellor of the Diocse (a lawyer) and he has delegated permission to allow a few types of memorials without consultation, but these do not include memorials over cremated remains in any circumstance. The situation in Braunston seems to have been 'irregular' for some time, but that is in the past. I have been asked to stick to the rules.

So much for the legal side of the consideration of memorials. On the more intimate, personal and, to me, more important side, I will always give sympathetic consideration of any request for a memorial in the Churchyard and, if consulted early enough, will guide anyone through the complexities of this situation which often arises at times when the bereaved are least able to cope with the niceties of the Lew. As I wrote in the Church Notices, I am hoping to establish an area where cremated remains can be interred and where memorials can be sited without recourse to the Chancellor for individual permissions. Until that happens could I ask Willagers to bear with me and the 'system' in this sensitive matter?
