sharing resources they can each improve their life style. A simple example is efforded by the modules found on the roots of all plants of the pea family. In these modules are bacteria which have the power to take nitrogen (which forms 4/5 of the air we breathe) and transforms it into nitrates which as we know, is a necessary we breather to the bacteria. For a long time the modules were regarded as a disease but they seemed to do no harm to the plant so were left alone. This process is known as symbiosis and is made up from two Greek words which mean "living together".
