VILLAGE NOTES Lime is an indispensable element in the constitution of all plants but certain plants only thrive in a soil rich in lime. Among these are Clover and the Brassicas (Cabbage family). Other plants will only live in soils which are acidic. Our local soil embodies boulder clay and large quantities of lime. To plants such as Heathers, Rhododendrons, Sundew andButterwort, lime and a non-acidic environment are lethal. Many of these plants include flowering varieties which are in bloom over long periods so they are favourites with keen gardeners. To grow them successfully in our area they must be rooted in a soil with an acidic base such as a thick bed of peat. On this base, Heathers both purple and white can be grown and are well worth the trouble. Several ferns also apprehiate similar conditions. However, some in this genus will, like Parsley Fern, cheerfully
