VILLAGE NOTES The mere mention of snails is enough to induce: an apoplectic fit in the minds of a gardener whether amateur or professional when he sees his carefully tended lettuce plants ravaged by these molluses. These form an important link in the food chain of many animals, birds, hedgehogs and others of our fellow creatures. Some humans after certain treatment regard them as a delicacy.

During the warmer parts of the year we can see the broken remains of shells beside a stone or concrete path where an enterprizing thrush has used the concrete as an anvil, broken the shell and extracted the succulent flesh within.

The snail begins life as a white spherical tough skinned egg, laid by the parent a few inches below the surface of the soil. It takes shape as an adult and at the same time develops a shell moulded to the shape as an adult and at the thickness seems to vary with the habitat which seems to vary widely. Some live on dry land, others favour fresh or salt water. The Rams Horn Snail found in our local ponds uses the surface tension to cross patches of water. The huge number of offspring which snails produce in all kinds of localities provide food for a huge variety of living creatures. Some gourmets regard the snails as a delicacy after certain treatment. Good luck to them but most of us prefer plainer fare. laid by the produce
