The Church is often told to keep its nose out of Politics, usually by politicians. But it is the belief of the Church that it cannot, because Politics is a part of the world - a part of God's Creation and as such is a legitimate part of the caring Church's work. Don't misunderstand me, I am not talking about Party Politics, that is something else; the Church does not (or should not) take sides in Party affairs. What does concern the Church is the human condition of living and working or not working.

The Church is concerned with the problems of poverty and affluence; the stresses of overwork and unemployment; the pain of adolescence and the strain of old age. I am not suggesting that the Church has all the answers to solve all the difficulties encountered in life, but we do have something to offer to people to help them to come to terms with the condition in which they find themselves. One of the areas of concern which has been highlighted in recent years is the plight of those who live and work in the deprived inner areas of some of our cities. On the 12th of this month we are having a visit from a clergyman who has worked for a number of years in one of these Urban Priority Areas and I hope that we can learn from him something of what we can do to show that he and his Parish are not forgotten. The Church Urban Fund, set up by the Archbishops, will provide some resources to show in a practical way that we care, but even a little encouragement does so much for people in an area where any outlook is usually desperate.
