The Church has been in the news lately. The Archbishop of Canterbury is to retire next January, and the Bishop of Peterborough has verbally attacked the Bishop of Durham before he can get in with his annual questioning of the bodily resurrection of Jesus. So what? we might well ask, in Braunston. The news media have started treating the succession to Canterbury as a 'race' in the same terms as the quest for political power — how wrong they are. And as a Church we will go on proclaiming the greatest miracle of all time, the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ, which brings hope and joy and comfort to so many millions of people. Easter is the Day of Resurrection, I hope you will join us to celebrate Jesus' victory over Death and the deeds of darkness. we might well
