The PCC has decided that it is time to provide more space for burials in the Churchyard extension (what we all call the Cemetery). This will be a big and expensive undertaking, because it is felt that we need to start again at the top, near Church Road. A new fence will need to be erected, and the old fence and hedge removed, and a new path will need to be laid. This can't be done in a rush, but it will have to be done soon, because there are very few grave spaces left. There are, however, some spaces which have been left within the existing area, and I would like to fill these before we commence the new section. None of these spaces have been officially allocated, but if anyone thinks that they have a space 'reserved', please get in touch with me and I will see what arrangements can be made.

After the storms and the damage of late January and early February, we have some beautiful warm summery weather. I was going to write that it is unseasonal, but I note that I said that last year! Perhaps late February is a warm and sunny time of the year; I hope the schoolchildren appreciated it. Spring will soon be here, and Lent starts on the last day of February. The seasons of the year give us many and varied jobs to do at work, in the home and in the garden, and the Church's seasons provide us with an equally varied range of things to do. Yes, I say 'to do', because we must always be positive and forward looking. Lent is traditionally a time of fasting - giving something up. That is not that we should be miserable about it, because we should have a good reason for our abstinence. It could be that we like to fast, just to discipline ourselves, and a good thing too, but we also have the opportunity to review our relationship with God, his people and his creation. And, it is a good idea to use the money we save to help someone disadvantaged, or some project which can help a vulnerable part of God's world.

CESSATION OF WASTE PAPER COLLECTIONS As already notified in the February edition, regrettably there will be no further collections of waste paper in Braunston. Every parishioner should have received a special circular last month in which the Chief Executive of the Independent Waste Paper Association based in Daventry explained in a concise manner the apparent reasons for U.K. merchants being unable to maintain collections. If anyone missed this circular further copies are available upon request. Hopefully the situation will change for the better in the not too far distant future enabling us to resume village collections. Meanwhile it seems most appropriate the opportunity is taken to say a word of thanks to all those associated with collections since we began in the Autumn of 1984. During the period of over 5 years, the Church Building Fund has benefitted by a sum in excess of £3,000 and last year alone approximately 50 metric tons of waste paper left Braunston for recycling.

Grateful thanks are due to all villagers who carefully put out their old newspapers, magazines and cardboard each month and also in recent years a number of folk in Daventry and surrounding districts for their contributions. Special thanks to the band of volunteers who turned up in all weathers to collect, using their own vehicles, and to the youngsters who helped with the loading. In the early days we were grateful for storage space and thanks are due to Viv and Alison for the use of their garage and the Thompsons for use of their barn. In September 1988 we streamlined our collection procedure by using the "Old Plough" carpark for loading direct into the skip and we thank John and Kath Brown for this facility. Last but not least grateful thanks to our merchant Hollands Waste Paper of Darlaston and particularly the drivers for their help and co-operation.

VILLAGE NOTES We are all welcoming the lengthening of the hours of daylight and even more so are the birds as this is a busy time of the year when they are building nests preparatory to laying their eggs. It is also the time at which the songsters are most vocal. Poets have gone into rhapsodies over the song of birds. Shelley poured out his thoughts in a lyrical description of the song of the skylark but more critical observation shows that lark cock bird is attracting his lady love and once he has secured her attention he is busy warning off any would-be rival. His song says "This is MY property and KEEP OFF or else", An extreme example is the behaviour of the cock robin. His sweet song will attract the lady of his choice but should a rival appear the first tenant makes such a ferocious attack on the intruder that the intruder beats a quick retreat to try his luck elsewhere. Very rarely for so distinguishable are the calls of the robin and surprisingly for so small a bird, the wren. Later on we hear the distinct call of the chiff chaff, as well as blackbird and thrush. Whether it is the harsh meandering call of the crow rock or the twitter of the house sparrow, all of the birds' calls convey the same message to another bird and if the songs are only second hand for the unfeathered bipeds why should we not enjoy the sounds which gladden our spring-time.
