VILLAGE NOTES Most insects at this time of year have settled in their winter quarters. Some like the lady birds prefer to gather

Ladybirds belong to the Beetle family, but unlike most insects they stand as being conspicuous by their bright colours against their background, but any sparrow trying to make a tasty meal of the ladybird will find that it has a most unpleasant taste, so the bird will in future leave alone what may seem an attractive titbit.

There are over 40 varieties of these friends of the gardener who devour large quantities of greenfly, and their larvas even more. In my area the 2 spot and 7 spot varieties are more numerous. The brighter outer wing cases carry black spots though these may exchange colours. Another variety less common in our neighbourhood is the 22 spot ladybird. It is a bright yellow with the 22 black spots. In the Middle Ages this insect was associated with the Virgin Mary so was known as the Beetle of our Lady and hence it became known as
