The house on the east side of Checkley Close - Southfield House - is part of a complex of buildings which emphasise its importance as one of the major village houses. It has an unusual southern aspact with only a few small windows facing the High Street. A wide carriage drive, closed by solid double doors, gives entry to a courtyward which is flanked by a row of stables. Beyond these are the remains of three small cottages which were once occupied by the outdoor scrvants of the main house. This looks out upon an ancient beech tree and a wide lawn in front of the kitchen garden. The house is in two blocks, the taller one contains the family rooms, the lower one originally housed the kitchen and the servants' quarters. The main door is on the south front of the house. It opens into a spacious hall with doors leading to the kitchen on one side, and the main reception room on the other. The house was the scene of much social activity when Mrs. Beech, a notable huntswoman related to the royal family, resided there.
