The coaching route along the Old Road passed by the Castle Inn, over the canal bridge and then turned sharp left towards Dunchurch. Another 'old road' crossed the field towards the church and village of Braunston. It is still visible as a depression in the grass to the right of the present path. On both sides of the old road lies the ridge and furrow of former ploughland. These ridges were made by the plough turning over the soil as the oxen tramped up and down the length of the field. The undulation of the land is a reminder of farming methods before the Act of Enclosure of 1779. Then Braunston grew its own cereals in a rotation of wheat, barley and fallow in three open i.e. unhedged fields.

Near the entrance to Manor Farm the old road into the village curves round towards the church and the High Street. Manor Farm is an early seventeenth century building which belomged originally to one of the Isham family, rich wool merchants and lords of the manor of Braunston for over a century until they sold out to Sir John Webb in 1687.
