Dear Parishioners,

The Church should not be involved in Party politics, in this country, or any other. As an institution, the Church should serve all people, wherever they come from and whatever their background; being tied to one particular political party gets in the way of serving those with different ideals. But the Church has to be wholly involved lives of people - and that means their politics as well. The most prominent intervention in the political life of the country, in recent years, was the report and action of the Church of England in the poorest areas of our big cities; the Urban Priority Areas. The Church spoke up for those who were the most deprived in our society and raised an enormous sum of money to carry out its own work in bringing some measure of relief, details of the progress of Church Urban Fund projects can usually be seen in literature on display in All Saints'. But the Church cannot raise money to carry out all the social work of whatever government is in power, those days are long gone; what we can do is to highlight injustices and make people aware that others are being made to suffer needlessly. One can hardly have a conversation, these days, without hearing of another person being made redundant or in financial difficulties of one kind or another. How helpless we all feel. If only we could do something. But individually we can't find all the jobs needed and I wonder where all the people who are going to live in the new Daventry Estates are going to work. What we can do is to be good neighbours, to help and support those who are thrown into these situations through no fault of their own, to be kind and understanding and sensitive to their inner needs and to remember that they are individuals, not statistics. In church we try to do all that and more, in our helplessness we remember those individuals, and the general situation, in our daily prayers, asking God for comfort and relief from anxiety.

At All Saints' we are trying to bring events to the village which might be of general interest. Next year there will be another concert by the Beauchamp Sinfonietta, sponsored by the Braunston Boat Show, and we hope to have a concert by the Cowbridge Male Voice Choir at the end of June. I am told that the acoustics of the church are very good for these concerts and hope that we will attract support for these events from a wide area.

VILLAGE NOTES by Dick Herne

Tudor House is probably older than the name implies. Its structure suggests that it is part of a mediaeval house. The front door opens on to a through passage which was probably the 'screens passage' between the hall and kitchen, as in many Oxford colleges. The kitchen side now forms a separate dwelling and shop which has a timber-framed frontage unusual in Northants. On its western face is a wooden framework similar to a chancel screen.

The house is described in the will of Gregory Isham, woolmerchant of Braunston, who died in 1558 and was buried beneath the chancel of the church. He had bought the manorial estate of Braunston from the Manners family in 1554. The will lists the contents of each room in the house including the kitchen, buttery, hall and the 'parlour' where the family could escape from the bustling life of the hall. The upstairs rooms contained a 'joyned' bed, a 'trust' bed and a 'standing' bed.

Outside behind the house was the 'wool house' where Gregory kept his main stock-in-trade, raw wool for export. He also bought woven fabric on the Flanders market for sale in this country.

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
