Dear Parishioners,

We have been going through an exercise, at All Saints', to try to look to the future - strategic planning, I think it is called. Every household was sent a letter explaining, roughly, what we were about. This was not a mail-shot, on the double-glazing level, but a deliberate effort to try to let the whole of this community know what we were trying to do and to invite some response from those whose church it is. We have, now, had our Parish Day and will make our plans for the next few years so that we can meet the needs of all the people of Braunston, should they need us. For our part, we know that God is active in the lives of us all and that we should respond to him. In our services we give thanks for what he does for us and ask for the strength to show our gratitude by serving not only those around us in this community but also those in the 'global village'. We know that we often fail, but take failure as the opportunity of new beginnings and new hopes for a better future.

If the village organisations chose to join in with what is happening on the canal we could have a jolly good jamboree and build up our Community.

Walter was Clerk to the Braunston Charities for 43 years, only relinquishing that post when his failing sight made it impossible to carry on. He remained a member of the VIP committee until his death. Perhaps the greatest tribute to Walter's loyalty to his companions and to this area was his election as president of Group 4 of the Northamptonshire Royal British Legion, an office of which he was justly proud. We shall all miss him.

VILLAGE NOTES

Gardening thoughts in February by Frank Cox

"If Winter comes, can Spring be far behind?"

We do well to heed the poet Shelley's reminder, for though February can be a cold and windy month nature is already stirring and there is much we can and should be doing.

After the strong winds of the past months it is wise to examine roses, trees and shrubs, especially newly-planted ones, firming in around the roots and checking supports and ties.

Take every opportunity whenever the soil is neither wet nor frost-bound to dig-over vacant ground. Freshly dug ground can be covered with cloches or plastic sheeting to warm up the soil and help promote germination for earlier outdoor sowings.

When preparing a new seed-bed any sifted ashes from the bonfire or old soot raked into the surface will prove very beneficial. Bedding plants such as lobelia, begonia, salvia and antirrhinum which need a long growing period for best results can be sown now provided you have a heated propagator or warm greenhouse to provide a temperature of about 60°-65°F.

Tidy up herbaceous plants using secateurs. Trim off the remains of old stems and leaves and rake in a top dressing of bonemeal or hoof-and-horn.

For the kitchen garden early varieties of potato will need to be set out in trays to encourage sprouting while hardy varieties of broad beans and peas can now be sown for an early crop, covering with cloches if possible.
