Dear Parishioners,

On July 24th 1991, the Queen, in Council, approved an Order which created the new Daventry Team Ministry, which includes Braunston. This Order comes into effect on the 24th January 1992. (I have not yet found out why there has to be a six-month delay!)

What difference will this make to the people of Braunston? In the short term, not a lot. The main reason for this scheme is the increasing shortage of clergy and money in the Church of England. The Established Church believes that it has a responsibility to all the people of England, so it cannot close down and concentrate where it is most 'successful'; the only alternative is to spread itself more thinly over the parishes - I am sure you know of clergy who have charge of two or more Churches (the vicar of Badby has five parishes to look after). Ever since I came, I have worked only 'part-time' in Braunston, giving some time to working in Daventry; my predecessor in The Rectory devoted some of his ministry as an Assistant Chaplain at Onley. The Rev. Bev. started this "to try to keep a Rector in Braunston", as he told me.

So, there will be no change in the amount of work I do in the Parish, that will continue as before and there should always be a resident Minister in the Parish. In the planning of the Daventry Team I argued strongly that the Team Ministers should live in their Parishes and retain the name of them, so one change is that I now become known as the Vicar of Braunston. The other change that will eventually be seen is the more rapid turnover of clergy - the Team Vicars have a contract of only seven years, no more Rectors with nearly twenty years standing like the Revds. Griffiths, Ruddy and Humphreys - but the Village will get used to that. The important thing is that there will always be a Minister available if required. Things may be tight and sometimes difficult, but we are here to stay.

With these slightly changed circumstances in mind, we are holding what we are calling a Parish Day on Sunday 19th January, from noon to about 3.00pm, to discuss our hopes for the future of All Saints', Braunston. You are welcome to come and to let us have your ideas for the future.

May God bless you all in 1992.

BELLRINGING

The main purpose of ringing bells is to call people to worship and act as a call to prayer or as a reminder that worship is taking place to those who cannot come. Bells are also rung to celebrate occasions such as weddings and other occasions of note, and have been for centuries.

We hope that you enjoy hearing Braunston's bells which do have a lovely tone, but we do realise that prolonged ringing may sometimes cause inconvenience.

If there is to be prolonged ringing at any time, we will try and forewarn you of when and why it will be happening.

This will be done by ringing a bell or by a telephone call if necessary.

VILLAGE NOTES by Mr. Dick Herne.

Next door to "Southfield House" is "The Cottages", an odd name for a house of classical appearance and proportions. Like other old houses in Braunston it is built of stone, but early in Victoria's reign was refaced in brick. The front elevation has a chequered pattern formed by the sides of red bricks alternating with the ends of blue bricks.

The roof has a steep pitch, originally designed to allow water to run off the thatch. The gables are edged with coping stones, a familiar feature in this locality.

Another building further along High Street - Langdon House - has a similar frontage but it has been extended in more modern brick, enabling it to be divided into two dwellings. The original building had large dormer windows with elaborately carved barge boards, probably added in the latter 19th century. This house with its large barn, yard and stables was once a farm belonging to the Reeves, one of the old Braunston families. In 1900 and 1901 they sold the farm to Mr. and Mrs. F. G. Langdon, who had a large family of seven children. They moved to Northamptonshire and settled in Kettering where they ran a successful business in engineering.

Mr. and Mrs. Langdon had a son, Mr. F. G. Langdon, who became a solicitor in Northampton.

He married Miss Mabel May, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. May of Northampton.

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
