Dear Parishioners,

I wrote, two issues ago, about the relationship between Church and State in England. I think I need to write a little more, particularly as I have heard it reported that some mistaken ideas are still circulating in Braunston. First, it is important to remember that Church Law is in fact the Law of England. The Church does not have rules imposed by the vicar as he thinks fit, or commandments sent from Peterborough just to upset parishioners; parliament fixes the rules/laws and the vicar tries to have them observed.

Many of the laws which involve the Church were framed at a time when it was assumed that all Englishmen were members of the Church and played their part in the running of it. That is no longer true, if it ever was, but has left some odd loose ends. Most people only come up against the rules at times of births marriages and deaths, and here they can be most irritating to the unwary, but a great benefit to the wise. Everyone who is resident in the Parish has a right to the services of the Church at these times. ALL parents living in Braunston have a right to have their child baptised in All Saints' Church; ALL persons resident in Braunston have a right to be married in the Parish Church (except divorced persons with a partner still living) and any person dying within the boundaries of the Parish has the right to be buried in the Churchyard. This is the Law of England for the protection of individual liberty, there is no question of Church membership required on the part of parents, intending brides or the deceased. There are, of course, exceptions to almost every rule, but these serve to improve the provisions I have mentioned; other people MAY avail themselves of the services of the Church, in certain circumstances, but these are too numerous to go into here. I have done my best to keep to the letter and spirit of the Law.

Since 'going to press', it has been announced that I am to be made Rector of Paston (in Peterborough) on 25th. November. It will be a sadness to leave Braunston and I will write

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about this in a later edition of the BVN.

GARDENING NOTES IN SEPTEMBER by Frank Cox.

One of the highlights of our gardening year must surely have been the visit of the B.B.C.'s "Gardeners Question Time" team for their recording here in March. What a pleasant, enjoyable and instructive evening we spent in the company of these friendly, knowledgeable

gardening personalities. As summer bedding plants begin to fade we must be thinking of what can go in their place to provide for attractive, long-lasting Spring displays. September and early October are the times when Garden Centres will have a wide range of spring bedding plants and bulbs. Bellis (Double daisies), Forget-me-nots, pansies and violas can all be set out in September while many of us will also be putting out our Sweet Williams and Wallflowers. Plant daffodils and other bulbs in informal groups between shrubs and herbaceous plants in beds and borders. Tulips are not usually planted till later but it is as well to get them as soon as they are available and store them in a cool place.

Towards the end of the month hanging baskets will need to be stripped down and replanted with winter-flowering pansies to provide colour in the dark winter days. Summer Fuchsias and Geraniums should be potted up in a frost-free place to over-winter.

Summer months. Spike the lawn to aerate it and brush in a top-dressing of sand and sieved garden soil. Oversew thin areas with grass seed and re-seed or re-turf bare patches. For the last few mowings of the lawn raise the mower blades.
