Dear Parishioners,

I have written before about the relationship between Church and State and would like to touch on the subject again. The position of the Church of England within our community has been established by Act of Parliament, so many things which may at first seem odd or a little quaint are, in fact, the law of the land. The Churchwardens are chosen by the people of the parish, so are really the village's Churchwardens with responsibility to look after Braunston's church for the future of Braunston. The Sidesmen (male and female) are elected to assist the Churchwardens in their duties and on Sunday 6th. June the Archdeacon of Northampton is coming to Evensong (6.30pm) to commission them and affirm them in their place in our community. This is no empty gesture. The Church believes that we are all made in the image of God and that the Church must exist to cater for all people and be readily available to them whenever it is needed. We find it a little sad that more people don't come to All Saints', on a regular basis, to give thanks for all God's gifts to us, but we are determined to be around for all those occasions in life when God seems to be important, whether in joy or in sorrow. God is in all our lives and the Church helps us to realise it. Whether the Church and the State should be as intertwined as they are is a political question; the Church will always serve the nation, come what may, and our Churchwardens and Sidesmen will go on being people of the village serving the village through the Church.

VILLAGE NOTES - HERITAGE by Janet McCarthy.

Those of us who were lucky enough to have a village childhood, look back with nostalgia to the sense of freedom, and the simple pleasures derived from our surroundings. Memories of playing in meadows full of lady's smocks, Clover, Ox-Eye Daisies and Buttercups, in those seemingly endless days of early summer. Arriving home tired and happy with our shoes, socks and legs (no jeans in those days) yellow with pollen.

Memories too, of the sows that roamed free in the fields, and the strange, prickly sensation, as we scratched the coarse hair on their backs as they lay grunting and sighing with pleasure in a damp shady spot. The village streets too held a fascination for us, the old houses huddled and leaned together, as if to support one another. Twisting alleyways and hidden gateways, opened up fantasy worlds to our fertile imaginations.

Alas, many of the meadows are now lost under estates of much needed housing. The cottages too have gone, many of them condemned in the 1950's, and modern farming techniques sentence the majority of pigs to a short and unnatural life of confinement.

We are lucky here in Braunston, we still live in a beautiful setting, what is left of the old village, the Marina, the canal and its surroundings are designated 'Conservation Areas' and the fields from the canal to the railway line are classed as 'Important Open Space'. We as villagers are the custodians, and must all take on the responsibility of ensuring that the generations that follow us, benefit from the care we take of this heritage, so that they, do not have to look back with regret, at what has been lost.
