Dear Parishioners,

The issues of crime and its punishment are filling the columns of
newspapers and taking much air time, as I write. This is not a new
subject and most of the solutions being put forward have been heard
before and many tried. But crime is still with us and it seems to be
increasing so is likely to be with us for a long time to come. In the
Victorian age many worthy people saw poverty as the root cause of crime
and worked hard and spent much money on relieving poverty, but crime
did not go away. There is no doubt that poverty and social deprivation
contribute to 'forcing people into crime', but no-one acts against
their own instincts unless driven very hard. It would seem that our
materialistic society has raised expectations so high that those with
more than enough want even more. This may be understandable, but is
selfish - especially as we see on our television screens, daily,
people the world over with nothing.Selfishness is not a crime, but can lead to an awful lot of wrongdoing.
In Lent, the time between now and Easter, it is a good idea to look at
our own motives for the things we do; are they for our own advantage
and someone else's disadvantage? do we just want more? do we care who
gets hurt by our plans? If we are only out for what we can get for
ourselves then we are doing wrong, by our neighbour, by God and, maybe,
by the law. It is by the moral values of society that one can judge how
'good' life can be, and if life is 'good' what point in crime?A quick post-script to last month's letter. If you want to know anything
about Baptisms, Weddings, Funerals or the Churchyard, do come and ask me
or the Churchwardens. We are always ready to help and it is NOT too much
trouble to answer your query. If you ask us you are likely to get an
accurate answer, which may not be the case if you 'just ask a friend'!

VILLAGE NOTES by Dick Herne

Ash Tree House, one of the larger houses in the village, stands in a walled garden. Its facade has changed little since it was built. The South side of the Green has seen several alterations. A mid terrace cottage has a new stucco front that gives it extra height. New bungalows have replaced a long line of farm outbuildings. By the path that leads down to Bottom Lock there was once a sawpit where two men worked a two-handled saw cutting planks of wood from tree trunks. Next to it are two cottages that belonged to the parish and were used to house the homeless poor before the days of the workhouse. Adjoining them is a small double-fronted house that once belonged to Braunston's 19th century schoolmaster Mr. E. Smith who painted pictures of the village and the canal. Jettyfields House has a modern datestone - showing the year 1647 - and retains its small narrow windows.

The factory entrance has replaced a lane which contained many small cottages, one belonging to the Rodhouse family who moved to The Shambles. The two cottages beyond it were once a village inn known as The Dolphin.
