#### Tribute - Brian Dawson

In January, after a brave struggle with ill health, we were all saddened by the death of a dear friend.

Brian Dawson was Head teacher at Braunston School from January 1968 to July 1978. He started his Headship in what is now the Village Hall where conditions were a little crowded (he had to share his Office with others!) Two Terms later he moved to the present School site. His ten years at Braunston School were very happy ones and I'm sure at his funeral there will be many Staff and pupils from those days coming to pay tribute to him. His contact with the School continued as he became Chair of governors in his retirement.

Brian was also Church warden at All Saints for 16 years (As Eileen says; "he got through five Vicars!"). Personally, I found Brian to be a great encourager, generous in his support of both All Saints and the Daventry Team. Our present Churchwarden, Charles Dunn summed Brian up when he referred to him as "a rock" in the Church. Those who knew Brian, knew him to be a real gentleman, wise, and with a wonderful quiet sense of humour. He will be missed by many friends and family.

Our sincere sympathy and prayers go out to Eileen, Alexander and Simon.

#### Vicar's Letter

Dear friends, "Shortcut to GOD"

Recently I was browsing one of the Christian Websites and came across an interesting looking link. When I moved the cursor across it, up popped the message "shortcut to GOD". Ever the optimist, I clicked on the link and waited expectantly......sadly though it wasn't some direct line into the heavenly realm, just another webpage!

Often I am asked by people who probably wouldn't describe themselves as regular Churchgoers for prayer. Sometimes seriously when there is a real crisis, often somewhat flippantly perhaps for good weather or something similar. But whatever the case my reply is usually the same, "Yes of course I'll pray, but I think you should as well", to which the reply is often, "Oh but it would be so much better coming from you I don't think He would listen to me". Oh for that shortcut to God, that direct line!!!

The fact is God hears all our prayers, whether they are beautifully eloquent, or stumbling and hesitant. Whether they are long and rambling or spoken in silence. Whether they are full of anger and sadness, or happy and joyful. All prayer is important and valued. We all have the same route, the same shortcut. Prayer is the most important thing that we can do.

How often have you heard someone say in a desperate situation "<u>All</u> we can do now is pray" as if it is a last measure, when all else fails. Prayer is the single most important thing that we can do and should

do, at anytime and in any situation. And we don't need to worry about getting it right, saying the right words, ensuring that we are in the right situation or properly "centred down" ~ these things are good, but just getting on with it is the most important thing, wherever we are and whatever we are doing we can all make room for prayer.

Yes it is good to set aside a special time each day for prayer, say in the morning or last thing at night, to offer the day to God. But if you can't set aside a regular time, or you don't find silence helpful, don't use that as an excuse to not pray. Instead pray where you are, or when you can, on the bus, in the car (preferably with eyes open!), at home, at work in fact any time. Get into the habit of becoming aware of God's presence, or asking him to show you where he is in any situation or ask him to guide your thoughts and actions. Let the Spirit which is in each one of us, pray through you.

But above all use the shortcut that we have all been given and PRAY! Because unlike the shortcut on the website, this one really does lead to God.

# JETTY FIELD. JANUARY 2006 - "I DREAM OF A FAIR FIELD FULL OF FOLK" [AND FLOWERS].

The dream of a rejuvenated Jetty Field is actually a memory for some: a painting of yellow buttercups followed by different coloured drifts of vetch and smaller wild flowers later, easing through the young grass leaves. And the field as it was 40 years ago is amazingly what it would have been 400 years ago and before. The result of a pattern of farming that grazed animals in the winter and was patient enough to wait for the wild flower seeds to form and drop before mowing for a hay crop. Then the hay was sweet from the young grass and mixed with the tastes of varied plants.

Sadly the field has been neglected of late and the nutritious grasses that would have been encouraged by the nibbling of sheep or cattle have been replaced by rougher types of grass that have themselves crowded out the flowers. And then the final stage of neglect: rank nettles, docks and thistle. What a mess.

So we have a cunning plan - not ours entirely but under advice from several agencies. Graze the field in the least obtrusive way we can find, delay mowing until the optimum time for seed drop, produce a crop of hay that we can offer for sale. Too simple? No, because of a lucky set of past events. Our field has never been spread with artificial fertilisers

or herbicides so it has a reasonable basis of the soil requirements we need. It has never been ploughed [not in the war?]. The ridge and furrow has never been flattened. And even with the many recent years of neglect there may still be seeds of wild flowers lying dormant, waiting for the right environment to be restored.

It may well be that we have the only field in the county that can demonstrate such an unbroken history into the past.

Over the last two years we have been able to make some sort of start and two mowings have begun to clear the worst of the nettles and cut back the rough grass. Now we need some animals to complete the process and we hope to have the co-operation of a local farmer to allow a short period of grazing in the winter months, possibly of a hardy breed of sheep. We would have to ask dog owners to keep their charges on a lead for that period but all will enjoy the pleasures of the open field for the rest of the year.

And there is one more fascinating thread to the story. 50 years ago Duncan Gallie, the village schoolmaster, asked his children to bring in specimens of wild flowers growing in the village. Using his survey,

we hope to recreate a mix of flowers hat would have been blooming in the field. We need some help! As usual. First we need to identify the meadow lowers in the survey that would have lourished in Jetty field. Then we need o search for specimens of those lowers still growing in the district rom which we can collect seed. [We now of one likely meadow in Barby.] And it is so important to reintroduce vild flowers from nearby and not rom Morocco or wherever seed nerchants are currently sourcing their tock. We value our patch of piodiversity. Are there any botanists, piologists or those who care for plants out there?



## Braunston Walkers Saturday 17/12/2005 Wolfhamcote Walk (approx 6 Miles)



A cold, frosty and sunny morning saw 13 of us outside the village hall for the eleventh walk since we formed as a group in February 2005. The weather was, once again, absolutely marvellous as we set off on our last walk for the year. The plan was for the main group to meet Carol down at Brindley Quays and so we started off across Jetty Fields past the site of the new allotments where David and his team have recently been so busy and on down to the

canal. After some confusion with some of the party hankering for a big breakfast on the Gongoozlers Rest café boat, we finally regrouped at the start of the track to Wolfhamcote just the other side of the busy A45.

We followed field paths and gates across several fields and under the old dis-

used Central Railway embankment and then on across the fields to arrive back on the A45 at the Oxford Canal bridge. We continued up the footpath and back into the village where we had a well deserved pint and a warm up by the magnificent fire in the Old Plough after an excellent mornings walk.

A really big thank you goes to Phillip who started this group and whose organizational skills keep us, literally, on track. Lastly we would take this opportunity to wish all our members a very happy and prosperous New Year.

# Braunston Walkers Saturday 21/1/2006 Braunston – Flecknoe- Staverton approx 9 miles.

Sitting in the sunshine with a pint and a sandwich outside the Countryman, Staverton in mid January after walking past a field of Lamas is almost as likely as a bottle nose whale in the Thames but believe me it all happened on the same day! Earlier eleven of us set off from the village hall on our first walk of 2006. The sun shone down on us as we made our way down to bottom lock. The tow path is currently closed for essential repairs and the canal which had been drained the previous week is now full again but we set off along the Jurassic way and up out of the village. The views back over the village are superb from the top of the hill.

We crossed the A45 and carried on across the open fields till we reached Braunston Covert which was to prove to be the first of the many muddy sections. Leaving this with heavy and muddy boots we continued skirting around Berryfields Farm which had, as always, a flock of crows or rooks circling menacingly overhead like a scene from Alfred Hitchcocks's The Birds.

We eventually reached the Miry Bridge over the River Leam and left Northamptonshire entering Warwickshire. Walking across more muddy fields we arrived at the disused railway track which now forms a beautiful coarse fishing lake with a small hut complete with decking. After negotiating two muddy gateways we arrived in the village of Flecknoe. We passed some wonderful old Northampton stone cottages with fabulous views across the fields back to Braunston. Leaving Flecknoe we spotted two black Laboradors guarding the Bespoke Butchers. After Carol

handed out toffees which we all enjoyed, we walked out of the village back over the fields. The footpath crosses several fields and we came upon some beaters and their obedient dogs rousing pheasants in a shoot. Fortunately they were not aiming at us and we passed by quickly and safely.

Re-crossing the River Leam we passed a field of lamas (really!) and continued along a small valley with what looked like old disused mine workings and up a small tree lined lane into Staverton.

We stopped at the pub and sat outside sunning ourselves (I told you) eating lunch ready for the trek home. On the track Jane pointed out wildflowers such as Goundsel and Speedwell and we continued picking up more mud until we arrived back at Braunston Covert and really deep mud. Mud, mud glorious mud, nothing quite like it... etc. etc. We walked down the old London coaching road and back to the marina then up Nibbits Lane which seems to get steeper and back home for tea

The next walk to Crick and back is planned for 18/2/2006.




