#### A NEW BEGINNING ALLELUIA

Now is Alleluia Season —— you may have noticed !!!

Trying to say something original in an Easter message can be rather tricky, so many people before me will have done it clearer and better than I can but I watched "The Passion" on television and this helped me think with a clearer perspective.

Everything is different these days we could say, or is it?

The ancient city of Jerusalem today is divided between different faiths, Jews, Moslems, Christians, and the Christians are sub-divided again into Orthodox, Roman Catholic, Lutheran, Anglican, the list seems endless, all are fighting for their own corner, laying claim to a part of that Holy City, and of each Holy Site. It can be so depressing if we let it, but why should we let it get to us?

Today, Easter Sunday, is a day when Christians remember the incredible joy that came to the disciples when they heard that Jesus was alive again,

A joy that is also ours, hence the alleluias

Out of that smelly, dusty, Romanised, Hebrew city, came the knowledge that the love God has for us all could be found through the resurrection of His son Jesus.

In some ways Jerusalem has not changed, and it is the same now as when Jesus was alive some 2000 years ago. It is still a city of narrow streets and alleyways, ramshackle buildings, and multiple places of worship. The ancient temple is not there - only the one wall remains - where the Jews lament it's loss, observed by the Moslems whose Mosque with it's golden dome now dominates the site from above in the same way that the Romans over looked the temple from their fort when Jesus was alive, and now the Jews' lamentations are observed by bus loads of tourists and pilgrims who wander through the crowds armed with cameras and guides to Jerusalem.

It is easy to feel the tensions, just as it was in Jesus time, and like His companions (His disciples) we tread warily on ground we do not know.

Through the season of Lent we try in our minds to follow the paths that Jesus took, knowing that the end of the path for Jesus was crucifixion, or so it can seem. But now we know better.

This was not the end, it was just a beginning — a New beginning — a most amazing and wonderful beginning.

Because JESUS DIED FOR US, He died as the ultimate sacrifice to a loving creator God. Not in the temple where animals and birds were slaughtered daily as offerings to a God the Jews felt needed appeasing, but on one of the many crosses set up outside the city by the Romans to keep the quarrelling Jews under control.

To recognise Jesus as God's Son is the beginning of our faith, to acknowledge Jesus death and resurrection is to confirm all the

joy and ecstasy that we experience when we realise that death is not the end.

#### IT IS A NEW BEGINNING.

The idea of sacrifice to a God, (or to many gods,) died on that cross with Jesus. The God we believe in is a God of life and love, not of punishment. All that God asks of us is that we should live for Him and love Him back, and be truly sorry for all the times we fail Him. After all if we love someone, we try to do everything we can for them just as we would like them to do things for us, we try to replicate Gods love for us and for others in our daily lives.

Today is another beginning. The time when we can join in the celebration, and even join in an egg hunt despite the weather. It is the Alleluia season, or to put it into more modern language, it's 'Yubby dubby doo time', or as teenagers and my daughter would say, 'It's Cool'!

We should be jumping and waving our arms just as they do at pop concerts — I'm getting a bit old and lumpy for that — but in my mind I am all for it.

Rejoice, Be Happy, Pop a balloon, Let off a fire cracker, Eat an Easter Egg and shout ALLELUIA and spread the good news to everyone we meet.

#### JESUS IS ALIVE, JESUS IS LORD

# BRAUNSTON PRE-SCHOOL CELEBRATE EASTER AND THE OFFICIAL OPENING OF THE PLAYGROUND AT THE VILLAGE HALL

The Play Area was a long awaited improvement to the Village Hall something the Pre-School had wanted for a long time. However, eventually we had secured sufficient funds to turn a sad and neglected area of the car park into a safe and secure area for the children to play, exercise, ride their bikes, and have fun. And a new entrance into the car park was also created. This £35k project was funded with the help of Braunston Parish Council, Daventry District Council, and Braunston Pre-School, plus donations from grant making trusts and a £2500 donation from the e.on/Central Networks Safer Environment Fund.

An outside play area was often cited as desirable in the Pre-School's otherwise excellent OFSTED report. The Pre-school made a sizable donation to the project, and the children have themselves helped with raising money, with events such as a sponsored BOUNCE.

3raunston Pre-School is the most frequent user of the hall, and runs 5 norning sessions per week, and takes children aged 3 -5 from both 3raunston and Daventry district, and has been a user of the Hall since it first was converted from the old school in 1975. It is a registered charity that is managed by parents of the children who attend.

Further goods news is that our County Councillor, Robin Brown has recently approved a grant from his NCC budget to further help in improving the appearance of the Village Hall. Together with match funding from 3 raunston Parish Council, a further stretch of fencing and walling can be replaced over the next few months.

Infortunately, we now have to find the money to replace 2 further panels of the fencing, following a collision between a car and the fence on the 4shby Road last month - if anyone has any information as to who the driver was (who we understand was attending a funeral at the Church), call Lynne on 890865, as they drove away without stopping, and we are now left with a sizeable repair bill.





## **Avoid Distraction Burglaries** - Advice from the Police

With the start of the New Year it's a chance for people to get into good habits to try and avoid becoming the victim of distraction burglaries.

The number of distraction burglaries in the county as a whole has fallen in the last year but police want to see the number lowered even further.

A police spokesperson said: "We would encourage people in the community to pass on the message that distraction burglars can be beaten. Rogue workmen and distraction burglars rely on engaging someone in conversation as the first step towards getting into their home. If people can remember not to open the door if they are not expecting someone to call, we can help cut the number of people who become victims of this callous crime even further."

# There is some clear guidance for people with regard to avoiding becoming the victim of distraction burglars.

- If you are not sure, don't open the door.
- Keep your front door, back door and windows locked at all times even if you are expecting someone.
- Fit a spyhole so that you can see who is there. Choose one with built-in intercom or speak to callers through a window to find out what they want.
- Don't be tricked. Only open the door if you know the caller or if they have made a written appointment to see you. Genuine callers won't mind.
- ID cards are easy to reproduce so don't trust them. Never use phone numbers printed on ID cards to verify the callers ID.
- Set up a password with utility companies. If the caller doesn't know your password then they aren't genuine.
- Don't use tradesmen who call offering to do work. Good quality workmen will be too busy to look for business this way.
- Don't keep large quantities of cash at home use a bank account instead.
- Avoid buying or selling any goods or services at the door.
- Ring the Police if you have received a visit from anyone you are suspicious of you may prevent your neighbour from becoming a victim.

Genuine businesses won't mind being spoken to & checked out, as these criminals are taking business away from them. Please do not place yourself at risk at any time. You can pass on any details or concerns in a number of ways.

#### Braunston Walkers - Walk Saturday 15 March 2008 Burton Dassett (9 miles)

Fifteen of us met up for the short drive to The Burton Dassett Country Park to start the walk. This is an amazing landscape of dramatic hills and old disused quarries more like the Peak District than Oxfordshire. Our walk took us down the steep Bonfire Hill and into the village of Northend. We turned right and soon left the village on a footpath towards Fenny Compton. The path took us over several muddy fields below the hills of the country park until we arrived in the old village. Crossing the road we turned up a small lane to the beautiful old stone church presumably built with stone quarried near Bonfire Hill.

The path leads back into fields alongside the church and then rises steeply up Mill Hill. We arrived at the top puffing like the steam engine some one in the group claims to have seen. There is an old house on top of this hill at 157 metres and it has a lovely old stone mill, hence the name. We paused and enjoyed Jane's flapjacks and sweets supplied by Terry and Marion, as we gazed over the surrounding scenery looking back to the hills which rise to Magpie Hill at almost 200 metres. After a suitable rest we ploughed on over more fields and past an old pond dropping down to a bridle way where we turned right and eventually left onto a small road known as The Slade. We followed this for about half a mile and then took a footpath on the right which takes you over the 178 metre hill known as Windmill Hill. Dropping down to the village of Farnborough we were greeted by a particularly noisy donkey annoyed that we hadn't brought carrots. The path, lined with wild garlic, enters the village between houses and comes out immediately opposite The Inn at Farnborough which was our welcome lunch stop. The food and beer was excellent and we sat by the open fire enjoying the break. Another highly recommended!!

After lunch we walked through the old village and dropped down to Farnborough Hall. This is a magnificent old stately home now administered by the National Trust. A fantastic house with wonderful gardens. We skirted around the old lake and rejoined the road before turning right on a footpath which leads sharply up hill towards Avon Dassett. We walked along a yellow gorse covered ridge with the M40 running along in the valley until we reached the village which has a protestant church, currently wrapped with polythene and scaffolding and a catholic church. We turned right on a footpath next to the pub and walked up yet another hill past lots of sheep with strange markings. Looking like a cross between a badger and a sheep.

Lots of newly born lambs in this field and a sure sign of spring as it started to rain. We were returning past Bitham Hill to enter Burton Dassett with its magnificent but huge church and then on up to the country park and our cars. Unfortunately with the rain the views all round were restricted. You can see the Lickey Hills and The Malverns as well as across to Napton and Charwelton from the Beacon on top as a rule but sadly not today. This is a fantastic walk through magnificent scenery and not that far from home. Come and join us on our regular monthly rambles, on the third Saturday each month. We are an informal group of friends who enjoy monthly rambles. They are not too strenuous, are a great way to have some healthy exercise, meet new friends, take in the occasional pub and make the most of our beautiful local scenery.

Remember you don't have to do the full walk some of our members arrange pick ups from the pub stop halfway, normally 5 or 6 miles. Please call either Phillip on 01788891437 or Ray on 01788891384. We normally meet at 10 o'clock at the village hall.
