A Better Way Forward - Revd. Sarah

There is a man-eating Octopus at large in Britain. Nowhere is safe from its snaky tentacles and it seems to get stronger day by day. It can and will be conquered in the end (the whole point of the Christian message) but not before it has done a great deal of damage and taken many lives. That may sound rather melodramatic (what sort of a maniac vicar have you been landed with!!??) but I truly believe that unless we get our backsides off the fence and make a strong moral and spiritual stand for what is truly important we shall lose what we hold most dear about life in this country.

In a couple of weeks time I am conducting a wedding here in Braunston. Maybe that is not big news for anyone except the happy couple and their family. But this couple currently live in Croydon, just around the corner from what remains of Reeves furniture store, which the whole nation saw in flames on the television and which has already come to be a iconic symbol of the riots that we have seen in the last few weeks.

I sat with the wedding couple last week here in Braunston and they told me what it felt like to stand at the window of their flat and see and hear the rioters and looters coming towards them. They described the confusion of knowing that seven floors up they were probably safe from looters but unlikely to survive if somebody torched their building. That couple are just one innocent degree of separation between the hell on our city streets and Braunston. I bet you know of other links too.

We tend to assume that villages like ours are insulated from the fearful things that happen in our towns and cities. Things like that don't happen here thank God. OK, the youngsters get a bit bored sometimes and we might get a bit of graffiti, the routine hurling of obscenities by boys on bikes at another boy not in their group, minor theft, a bit of drunkenness or someone we know high on low-grade drugs (bought openly by youngsters in at least one village I know) But basically we are OK here aren't we? Well I would say yes and no.

What we have seen on our streets has not been



the work of a starving and oppressed people rising up for justice. Gratuitous violence, callous disregard for the lives of others and the glee on the faces of the perpetrators are simply evil and Evil is like a huge man-eating Octopus. As with these riots the main body of trouble is clear for all to see but the sly tentacles of influence slipping in through crevices and cracks across all of society are often not observable or considered dangerous until it is too late. Look out! Its behind you! Nether Heyford Church (yes-little rural peaceful Nether Heyford) was violently trashed last week by vandals and will now be closed except for worship. Barbarians 1 Decent people nil.

There is general agreement that Britain is in the throes of moral disintegration allied to the collapse of marriage. It is also a symptom of a move away from the sense of a higher authority than our own-a symptom of our move away from God and a way of life ordained by Him based upon faith and respect for others and all of creation. After all if we only judge ourselves by our own standards (however well meaning) the only way is down because frankly our standards are not very high and tend to be just a teensy bit self-serving!

The Church has done some vile things in its time but in general modern society ie the last 400 years or so- has been based on an understanding of decency and morality and firmly Christian principles. Whether or not you are "religious" it is Christianity that underpins what is good and true about this society. It has been the Church that has initiated almost all social reform, abolition of slavery, education, health care, the welfare state-you name it. Perhaps you believe that faith has had its day but I do not see anything beneficial ready to fill the space. If people believe in nothing they will find something to fill the void and we've just seen a taste of what that looks like. Nether Heyford is not about doctrinal opposition to the church. Its about lawlessness and mischief making. The Daily Mail has been full of praise for the Islamic and Sikh faith communities standing up for family life. The implication is that Christians are too weedy to care. Perhaps for you one faith is as good as any other but if you cherish the good things that our society still rest upon then they need defending.

It is time to stop sitting on the fence as far as faith is concerned. Our children need to know how to defend themselves against the tentacles of the giant octopus of social Evil and to have some real values to rally to. I'm not asking you to pick up a tambourine and talk about Jesus. I'm asking you to think about what is important - not what is easy and convenient but important. A life lived for the common good. A life in which faith may grow and freedom and safety may prevail. A life in which nobody wants to perpetrate evil just for the fun of it.

So if you are on the fence, slip off it. Step forward if you want to retrieve a lost faith or discuss your anger with God and Church. Step forward if you would like to explore today's big issues with a God perspective. From the end of September I shall be running a series of classes for those coming forward to be Confirmed - those who are ready to make a commitment to God and His Church. Even if you are nowhere near that level of commitment but want to see a better way forward than the world seems to offer lets talk. For heaven's sake.


At All Saints' Kids Club a warm welcome awaits children from 0 upwards. Mums and Dads can can stay and enjioy thye service while the youngsters have fun.



NEWS FROM THE VILLAGE HALL

The Community Development Team from Daventry and District Housing asked me to give them a presentation last Tuesday to tell them about the needs of the Village Hall. This Team is made up of Daventry Council tenants who are able to allocate funds to projects to help improve the environment.

I subsequently had a telephone call from the Housing Department to tell me that the Development Team had decided to offer Braunston Village Hall a grant of £5000 for improvements but in particular the replacement and renewal of the floor in the Main Hall. This is a wooden, parquet tiled floor that is worn and lifting in places. We are already obtaining estimates and quotes. It is the intention that the work be carried out during the school holiday period when it will cause the minimum of inconvenience. This is a most welcome and generous donation.

WEEKLY COLLECTIONS FOR CLOTHING THIS AUTUMN

Plans for new weekly kerbside collections of clothing, shoes and soft toys in Daventry District and Northampton will be introduced this autumn.

Northampton Borough Council and Daventry District Council's new environmental services contractor Enterprise had initially hoped to launch the weekly textile collections this month alongside other changes to the waste and recycling service.

However, with residents making great efforts to recycle, there has been a large rise in the volume of other materials that have been collected. This has meant that the current collection vehicles do not have enough space to accommodate additional clothing.

Weekly textile collections will now begin this autumn when the contractor introduces new vehicles with larger recycling compartments.

In the meantime an appointment system has been put in place for residents wishing to request a textile collection and it will be collected from their homes within four working days.

Enterprise will continue to donate money from these collections in Daventry District to the Warwickshire & Northamptonshire Air Ambulance.

Enterprise Partnership Director Simone Wade said: "The kerbside vehicles being used at this very early stage of the new service unfortunately do not have the room to accommodate textiles collections. This is due to a large rise in the volume of other recyclates we have been collecting, following residents' efforts to recycle more.

"We apologise for any inconvenience that this has caused residents who were expecting new weekly textile collections as set out in their leaflets, but we can assure them that these will be in place in the autumn when new vehicles with larger compartments are introduced. We are putting alternative arrangements in place and if customers phone their council to request a textile collection, they will then be collected within four working days."

Daventry District Council's Environment Portfolio Holder Councillor Daniel Cribbin said: "It's encouraging news that we're seeing an increase in recycling during these first few weeks of the new joint service.

"We hope this slight delay in an improved textiles service does not deter residents from continuing their excellent recycling efforts."

Cllr David Mackintosh, Cabinet adviser at Northampton Borough Council, said: "One of the benefits of our new partnership is that it provides many more opportunities to recycle. I hope people will continue to keep recycling everything they are able to. While textile collections are currently available by appointment we will further improve the service when we introduce weekly textile collections to all households in the autumn."

Is your garden too big for you?

Are you finding the work your garden needs too difficult?

You could find a solution and help others at the same time.

Braunston's Pocket Park includes allotments where villagers grow their own produce. Unfortunately, as in most places Braunston has a waiting list for allotments. People who have no access to land or who do not have a garden that is big enough to grow what they would like have applied for an allotment but all are being used.

The Jetty Fields committee whose responsibilities include the Braunston allotments would like to start a garden share scheme that is already operating successfully in dozens of communities around the country.

If you have an underused part of your garden you could allow a grower to use it. The Jetty Fields committee plans to put potential growers in touch with garden owners.

The benefit to the growers is that they can get cultivating without spending years on a waiting list. The garden owners have the pleasure of seeing a well-tended vegetable plot and the sense of community in being part of a sharing initiative.



BRAUNSTON WALKERS

Return to Bradgate Park (c.10 miles) Walk Saturday 20/8/2011

Last time we walked at Bradgate Park, deep in the heart of Charnwood Forest, we had to contend with mist and fog and everywhere was distinctly murky but everyone asked to do it again as, even in those unpromising conditions, it was still an excellent walk. This time we started with a mix of sunshine and clouds but dry as we started at the car park at Swithland Woods which is only £1 to park and not the exhorbitant £7.50 charged in the main car park. Not that I am mean but really £7.50!!! Leaving the car park, through a gap in the stone wall, twelve of us crossed the road and entered a tree lined lane that lead steeply uphill to the park. We could see Old John tower on the hill looming above and our path continued to rise before going through a high, deer proof fence into the park. Pausing for breath we enjoyed fantastic view as we climbed up through bracken and then on up an even steeper slope to reach the beer mug shaped Old John tower. We sat at the base of the tower to enjoy the spectacular views all around. We could make out the wind farm just north of Kilsby over the sprawling city of Leicester.

Fortified with Nigels sweets we walked down the hill through the bracken to reach the ruin of Bradgate hall, the ancestral home of Lady Jane Grey, who won the award for Shortest . Serving Monarch having ruled for only 9 days in 1553. The old brick built ruin with its interesting old diaper pattern brickwork was the home of her parents the Duke and Duchess of Suffolk. As we stood looking at the old ruin we could see a herd of magnificent deer next to the path that we were taking.

We crossed a river over an old stone bridge and then our path went off left to eventually reach another deer proof fence out of the park. We crossed a meadow and over a stile into a recently harvested field that leads up to a gate where we stopped to admire the views of Cropston Reservoir with a lovely old boat house and the magnificent back drop of Bradgate Park. Despite the recent rainfall this ground was extremely dry and dusty. Our path lead on alongside the lake to reach Cropston village, one of Leicestershire's linear villages, but unfortunately, not the one with our lunchtime pub! We walked through the village and then took a field path off to the left past a row of gently nodding sunflowers to reach a road where we turned right and carefully walked along the verge for a few hundred yards up to a sharpe right hand bend where we entered a footpath on the left and started to walk along the path to cross the clear river and then over fields in the middle of harvesting and eventually reach the village of Swithland with its houses built in local Swithland slate and more importantly our pub, the Griffin Inn.

With fond memories of how good this pub had been last time we had visited we were anticipating a successful lunch stop and it did not disappoint. Really quaffable Tiger bitter and delicious baguettes with crispy, large chips. A fantastic pub and of course highly recommended if you ever visit the lovely Bradgate Park. Superb!!

After lunch we set off along the village and then turned right over several fields to reach the old Great Central Railway bridge. This is a steam railway heritage line and although we didn't see a train this time out we certainly heard it as we were donning boots after lunch!

At this point we joined a footpath, the Leicestershire Round which is actually a 100 mile circular path taking in some of the best bits of the county. We walked up to a farm track and then along field paths at Rushey Field farm then took another field path eventually emerging at the western end of Swithland village. From this end of the village we munched mints supplied by Daxa before taking a footpath through beautiful, sylvan Swithland woods to reach the cars and home for a welcome cuppa. A great walk, good company and really great scenery.
