

Great Expectations

Once upon a time (more than thirty years ago) vicars were lovely. They cycled around their rose covered villages greeting and blessing their parishioners who all looked exactly like characters out of Miss Marple, (or latterly, Midsommer Murders). They never, ever, ever got cross with their banks or had unfortunate records with uniformed youth organisations or forgot to do those things that they ought to have done, such as applying their brakes in built-up areas. If they had to leave the village to go and consult the Bishop, they saddled their trusty Morris Minors and puttered away humming Onward Christian Soldiers or, on very special occasions if the conversation with the Bishop was likely to be trying, Fight the Good Fight. They knew all their parishioners down to the last Jack Russell, not biblically, but very well indeed. Everyone was visited regularly and everybody knew that the Dear Vicar was their Dear Vicar. It is anecdotally acknowledged by those who know about these things that vicars drank 95% of all the tea imported into this great nation (thus doing their bit for the economy and overseas aid as well as possessing magnificently well- functioning bladders) and were indirectly responsible for at least 57% of all the Victoria Sponges baked in rural Britain during the last century.

Ah. Those were the days, when every little village had its church and its vicar! When a vicar could do a really good job of attending to the pastoral and spiritual needs of 200 people and turn out one good service on a Sunday morning before going home to be with his family. Now the average rural vicar has 7 sprawling villages and 7 churches with 7 fetes, 7 church councils, 7 collapsing roofs, 3 schools and frankly, not a hope in Hades of knowing or visiting most of his or her parishioners. I'm better off than some. I only have two villages but am required to spend around a third of my time in Daventry which has a population of 24,000 people. This means things have to be done differently! I love my job so I'm certainly not seeking sympathy here, but it is very different to how most people imagine of course this means that I am continually falling short of people's expectations.

I know that there are people who feel disappointed that I have been here over a year and have not visited them yet. I am so sorry about that. I know that there are people who were in hospital for weeks "and the vicar didn't even visit once" (The vicar is many things but not telepathic! Please tell me if someone is in that situation!) I know that I found myself yesterday apologising to a lonely gentleman who needs at least a weekly visit and a daily phone call from somebody to feel that it is worthwhile being on the planet. When he turned up at my door for the third time in a week asking for nothing but some company, to my shame I told him off for making too many demands on my time. What???! Like many in these villages, (let alone on some of the estates in Daventry) his needs and expectations far exceed my ability to deliver and I hate how that makes me and him feel.

I think there is a solution. Most of the day to day stuff does not require a vicar so if you think that you might have time once a week or once a fortnight to go and have a chat and a cuppa with someone who is unwell or housebound or just a bit lonely or low please get in touch with me. If you are someone who would enjoy a visitor every now and again get in touch too. I'm talking about social contact here. If pastoral or spiritual matters come up then of course I will get involved. Think about it.

Still on the subject of expectations - just a quiet word about BVN but don't let Jenni know I'm saying this. Being editor is a huge voluntary commitment, especially when your health is not brilliant. To have people writing sharp letters or accosting you in the shop over small errors in titles or English grammar is soul destroying and the fastest way to encourage an editor to step down. Some of the criticism that flies the way of the editor is unacceptably unkind. This is neither a paid or professional role. It is voluntary and time consuming and I would ask the critics to adjust their expectations accordingly and when things are not right to think carefully how to communicate that lovingly.

I'm off now to rev up (geddit?) my morris minor (I genuinely do have one but it's a bit chilly and damp at this time of year and my Mum doesn't like the fact that it has no seat belt so I use it sparingly) Have a good month. Don't forget our service in Braunston on Friday November 2nd to remember and light candles for those you have loved and lost over the years. If you need transport let me know.

APPLICATIONS OPEN FOR PRIMARY SCHOOL PLACES

Families who'll be celebrating a child's fourth birthday between now and the end of next summer are being urged to apply on time for a primary school place for September 2013.

And with the current pressure on capacity in the county's urban schools Northamptonshire County Council is reminding parents of the importance of identifying the three schools they would prefer to send their children to.

Cabinet member for children, learning and skills, Councillor Andrew Grant said: "The admissions system gives families the chance to tell us which schools they'd prefer to send their children to.

"While most people are successful at getting a place at their preferred school, there are steps that parents can take to maximise their chances. Submitting an application form in time is the most crucial followed closely by nominating a second and third choice school.

"The bottom line is that there are no guarantees of getting into a preferred school but the chances of a successful application will be higher if parents tell us before the deadline which three schools they'd prefer."

Applications are being accepted online from this week until Tuesday 15 January 2013 for primary school places for children who will be four years old between 1st September 2012 and 31st August 2013.

Applications received after the deadline can result in parents being unable to secure a place in any of their preferred schools.

This year,931 primary school applications were received outside the application period. The majority of those applications were for reception and years 1 and 2.

Protect your Village Halland possibly save lives

Your Village Hall is a charity for the residents of Braunston.

It is funded by the hire of accommodation and some very kind donations. Over the last two years over £20,000 has been invested in re-decorating, installing a new floor, some new windows and new Main Hall curtains.

All this has been done for the people of Braunston.

All this could be put in jeopardy by the risk of rain damage.

Let me explain: Just one dislodged tile could lead to terrible flood damage and undo all the good work. Over the last few weeks householders near the Hall have reported seeing young people, usually boys, climbing over the roof, although two girls have been recorded. The roof structure is not designed to carry such weight without proper roofing ladders and support.

This is obviously a very dangerous situation. Teenagers think they are immortal and somehow immune from harm. The rest of us know differently. Please protect our young people from themselves and protect our Hall from flooding. If you know who they are, then, for their sake, quietly warn their parents. In any case the Trustees, in accordance with their legal duty, have advised the police what is happening. In case of structural damage the Trustees are legally bound to seek recompense from the parents.

If you see anything suspicious then please call the Police on 101.



Braunston School **Junior Road** Safety Officers



Over the past year we have been working with PC Kevin, Braunston's village CSO, to monitor the parking around Braunston school. Four of us from year 6 have been going out for about half an hour each week. We have been looking to check that cars have not been parked on the yellow zigzag lines, across driveways, on the pavement or too close to corners. Pc Kevin told us that cars should not be parked any closer than a lorry's length to a corner (that's 10m away). We have been recording details in a booklet which tells us the date, time and registration of cars not parked properly. Each term PC Kevin comes in to collect our data and talk to us about the parking. These are some of the things we have talked to him about;



BRAUNSTON WALKERS

Walk Saturday 150912 - Gumley (9 miles)

Gumley lies in a beautiful part of rural Leicestershire and this walk includes the perfect pub. Ten of us met up on a lovely sunny day outside The Bell where the landlord was ready and waiting to take our lunch time order. Unfortunately we had to get the walk out of the way before lunch so we set off, briskly, along the main street, uphill, passing an Italianate tower which stands on the site of Gumley Manor which was used in the second world war to train resistant fighters and SOE agents. Reaching the old stone church we skirted Gumley Wood on the footpath which is part of the Leicestershire Round (a 100 mile circuit around the county) and walked over a field where the pub landlady was exercising her dog, crossed a road and re-joined the footpath down a steep hill. What goes down must go up as they say and we soon found a very steep climb up onto Smeeton Hill with spectacular views from the summit over the blue, sparkling, Seddington Reservoir and all around Leicestershire's rolling farm land. We followed the top of the hill and then plunged downhill to cross a manmade channel which takes water from the reservoir to top up the nearby canal, over a natural stream and steeply uphill (there is a theme here!) into the village of Seddington where we turned left past the pub and then left again in front of the old church through Manor farmyard and along a path to reach the Mowsley Road. To avoid a difficult path along the valley we turned left and followed the road happily sucking Nigel's sweets and then took a field path off left opposite Brook Farm. We romped down to a valley then along several fields to reach an old track leading into the lovely, sleeping old village of Laughton. From the village just after the tiny old school our path lead over a field of sheep. We passed several dead sheep and some others that were obviously neglected and in need of some care. This did not seem right and we contacted the RSPCA who subsequently sent someone out to investigate. We crossed a small road and followed several fields dropping gradually downhill then branched left to cross an old railway and over another field. In front was a really steep hill but as the pub was at the top we were soon up the top and passing some horses to emerge in the main street. In the pub we were quickly ensconced over Wellingborough bitter and a fantastic two course lunch for £5.50. Splendid and the service was excellent well worth another visit. Publicans take note and check it out to see how it should be done. In the afternoon we emerged replete and turned right out of the pub, left at a junction then left again onto a path crossing fields to reach the amazing ten lock flight at Foxton. A great spot with lots of interest. We walked over a swing bridge and followed the peaceful canal to reach Foxton itself and back over several fields to reach a bridge over the canal and then a steady climb back to the cars at Gumley and home for a cuppa! This is a great walk in a fabulous area with super views. Why not come and join us? We meet at 10 at the village hall and our next walks are as follows: 17th November Everdon Woods (c.10 miles)15th December Christmas Walk (c.6 miles)



Over half of the concerns shared with me since I've been a District Councillor are traffic-

related, principally speeding and parking. Braunston, like most villages, simply wasn't built to accommodate the volume of traffic now on our streets. On both matters I work closely with the local police, chiefly with our PCSO. From April 2013 parking enforcement, both onstreet and off-street, will be decriminalised, becoming a civil responsibility of the local authority.

One of the parking pressure points in Braunston is at the school. Consultation will soon begin about introducing parking restrictions at the junctions of Barby Road with Church Road and Greenway to make the area safer. Yellow lines alone don't solve the problem; I'm also working with the school, Parish Council, DDC and NCC to explore the potential for a Walking Bus in the village.

The Daventry Transport Strategy, currently out for consultation, identifies the need for increased parking facilities in Daventry town, but not for any villages. I have responded, to point out what seems to me an obvious omission.

Northamptonshire Police is relaunching Community Speed Watch (CSW) in 11 pilot areas, training local people to use hand-held speed monitors. They say they'd like to extend the scheme across the county if more funding is secured. CSW runs alongside the Force's mobile speed vans and existing speed monitors, both used regularly on the A361 and A45 and sometimes in the village itself.

Northamptonshire Police has made close to the national average of a 6% cut in frontline policing since 2010. In neighbouring Warwickshire the cut is 16%. Decriminalising parking enforcement and introducing CSW may reduce demands on pressured police resources. But I don't believe that council contractors and volunteers are a substitute for a regular, visible police presence in our village.
